Consultations prior to the World Humanitarian Summit

"It is time for international humanitarian organizations to ensure a real shift of power to affected people, by seeking genuine partnerships with affected communities and other local and national actors, rather than treating southern NGOs and civil society organizations as sub-contractors."

UN High Level Panel on Humanitarian Financing

"The transformation of simple low-cost humanitarian organisations into complex transnational bureaucracies has brought mixed results: more vulnerable people than ever are being reached with assistance but the associated rising costs are unsustainable. The centre of preparedness and response needs to be reset at the national and local levels."

The Grand Bargain: commitments in 10 areas

Greater transparency

Co-conveners: The Netherlands, World Bank

Participation Revolution: include people receiving aid in making the decisions which affect their lives

Co-conveners: USA, SCHR

More support and funding tools for local and national responders

Co-conveners: Switzerland. **IFRC**

Increase the use and coordination of cash-based programming

Co-conveners: UK, WFP

Reduce duplication and management costs with periodic functional reviews

Co-conveners: Japan, UNHCR

Improve joint and impartial needs assessments

Co-conveners: ECHO, OCHA

Increase collaborative humanitarian multi-year planning and funding

Reduce the **earmarking** of donor contribution

Workstreams 7 & 8 were merged in 2018. Co-conveners: Canada, Sweden, UNICEF, ICRC 9

Harmonize and simplify reporting requirements

Co-conveners: Germany, ICVA

10 Enhance engagement between humanitarian and development actors

Workstream was mainstreamed in 2018.

Areas of mutual ambition

Quid pro quo

Humanitarians: Transparency, reduced costs, joint needs assessments

Cash, humanitarian-development nexus, localisation, participation

Donors: Reduced earmarking, multi-year funding, harmonized reporting
